Malamalama Now Provides After-school Enrichment 5 Days a Week

It would probably not be an exaggeration to say that LCPCS's after-school enrichment activities are becoming famous! Certainly, they are one of the most welcome and popular effects of the charter conversion.

This semester, the enrichment program has undergone some alterations to help it become a little more sustainable, and to provide an invigorating, exciting place for K through 8th-grade students to hang out, five days a week, until 5:30 pm. The A+ program, which has some-times served this purpose, requires a minimum enrollment which LCPCS often did not meet. Furthermore, for those families without State subsidies, A+ was pricey.

LCPCS's answer? Mālamalama. For \$50 a month, any family, no matter what the income, can enter a child into Mālamalama. (The price drops to \$25 a month for each additional kid.) Each afternoon, the students will eat a healthy snack, and then spend about an hour on homework. Tutoring is provided. Then, students will choose one of two daily enrichment classes (like hula, art, computer coding, Frisbee golf, yoga dance and more). The enrichment classes, as before, are taught by community members and school staff, who share

their own passions to open new worlds for the students. On Mondays, the middle school kids are bussed to Pa'auilo, where they join Pa'auilo Elementary and Intermediate students at the Koholālele Forest for an afternoon of history, culture and agriculture. The second bus run takes bus-riding kids home at 5:00 pm, although parents have until 5:30 to pick up their keiki at the school. Students can attend Mālamalama just on certain days, or on all five days, depending on their families' needs.

Former Mahope director, Aaron Mickelson, is running Mālamalama, so it's pretty much guaranteed that students will be enjoying a wide range of very cool activities. He will be assisted by Polet Rincon, and the school plans to hire a third instructor to help out. There are currently 38 kids enrolled, and there's a cap at 40, so if you are interested in enrolling your child, contact Aaron at <u>aaron.mickelson@lcpcs.org</u> right away!

Students Take Charge in 4th and 5th Grade!

Fourth and fifth grade teachers Megan Patten and Naomi Smith are doing something a little different with their students this year. It's called Genius Hour. Once a week, students are given one hour to work on a project of their own design. "You help the students discover what they're passionate about, and use that as a teaching vehicle," says Mrs. Smith. The idea is to help the kids get excited about learning by letting them pursue a project that is unique to their own interests. Projects this year include baking and recipe creation, frog dissection, designing and sewing doll clothing, researching pig hunting, making a surfboard, and designing a motor for a paper airplane. The projects can consist entirely of research, but Mrs. Smith encourages the students to create an end product, if possible.

When the projects are complete, each student will then give a presentation on his or her subject to the other students. (Mrs. Smith is hoping to have students give their presentations at a parent night,

but that is still in the planning stages.)

It's been hard for some of the kids to get focused, admitted Mrs. Smith. "It's a totally new concept for them to design their own learning. They just aren't used to thinking out of the box like that." But others are charging ahead with some really creative ideas. And *all* the kids are excited to pursue something that they are passionate about.
