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## School Renovation Wraps Up

The roughly three-million dollar whole-school renovation that started at LCPCS last May is wrapping up a little behind schedule, but no one's complaining, because the school looks fantastic. If any of you haven't been on campus recently, it's worth taking a look (just sign in at the front office first!).

The project involved several layers of contractors and subcontractors. SSFM International from O'ahu served as the project manager, and Summit Construction (also O'ahu) was the general contractor. Key Painting and LES Flooring, of Hilo, spent a *lot* of time at the school. Together, the contractors painted pretty much every surface available, replaced or refinished flooring, repaired

or replaced walls and ceilings as needed, repaired cabinetry, and replaced all the tack and white boards.

"We were really pleased with the way they worked with us to maintain the things that make this school unique, like all the wood in the columns and cabinets," said Business Manager Gerry Delgado. "They really tried to keep our original identity intact." For example, the construction crews had to custom build each new sliding whiteboard in the elementary classrooms to fit tracks that have probably been there since the school was built in early 1950s.

It's been a long time since the Laupāhoehoe campus has received this level of maintenance work: more than 18 years, at least, according to the staff who have been at the school the longest, although the auto shop roof was replaced, and there was some painting and work on the gym about ten years ago. (The courtyard buildings were re-roofed in a separate project at a cost of \$546,527 earlier this school year.) DOE is in charge of allocating maintenance funds issued via the legislative process, and controls maintenance funds for LCPCS because our campus is a DOE facility. Initially, this overall renovation was supposed to take place in 2010, remembers long-time employee Tracy Jardine. LCPCS wishes to thank the DOE for releasing the funds, and all the contractors for a job well done.

"The white boards are nice. The rooms feel less dusty and writing on the boards is less tedious for teachers and students," said senior Aaron Steffen. "The shininess of the varnished wood makes our school look authentic and pretty," added junior Gabrielle Glascock.

Seeing the extent of the work has generally helped students and staff feel more pride in the school, reported Mr. Delgado. "It makes me feel the school is headed in a positive direction, and that we're ready to turn over a new leaf, said one middle-school student.
